CANT BE CAUGHT TRIUMPHS IN MISTER LEWIE MEMORIAL

MOSCOW, Idaho— Appaloosa Cant Be Caught powered past the competition in race 11, the Mister Lewie Memorial Stake. Appaloosas went one, two, and three in the Grade 1, 400-yard race for three-year-olds and older was held at Remington Park in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on April 18, 2015. It had a field of seven, of which three were Appaloosa. The purse was valued at \$32,500.

Cant Be Caught (With Intent x Unique Form, AQHA by Rare Form, AQHA) a 3-year-old gelding, had a driving finish under jockey Cody Jensen, to cross the finish line in 19.661 seconds, earning an 93 speed index. The Oklahoma-bred Appaloosa won \$19,338 for his efforts and brought his lifetime earnings to \$126,191. This gelding is currently owned and bred by John Diediker of Kansas and is trained by Jeff Dean.

Major Tom (Red Storm Cat, AQHA x Eyesa Knockout by Mr Eye Opener, AQHA) a 4-year-old gelding, had a game second finish under jockey Jimmy Brooks, to cross the finish line in 19.744 seconds, earning a 91 speed index. The Oklahoma-bred Appaloosa won \$6,446 for his efforts bringing his lifetime earnings to \$227,053. The gelding is currently owned by Mary Hainline of Oklahoma and was bred by Gary Vaughan of Oklahoma and is trained by Eddie Willis.

Big Ennis (Country Chicks Man, AQHA x Texas Union by Moon Lark, AQHA) a 4-year-old gelding, was third under jockey Agustin Silva to cross the finish line in 19.861 seconds, earning a 88 speed index. The Oklahoma-bred Appaloosa won \$3,545 for his efforts bringing his lifetime earnings to \$46,452. The winning gelding is owned and was bred by Jimmy Maddux of Texas and is trained by Mollie Devereaux.

Show Me Your Glory (With Honors, AQHA x Miss Fancy Layne by R Limited Edition) a 3-year-old colt was scratched.
